Recently, I was reading Romans chapters 13 and 14 from E. H. Peterson's version *The Message*. Paul, the apostle and author, tells us that we should always be good citizens. We should vote, pay our taxes, and make wherever we live a better place. He reminds us that all governments are under God and God will judge what is evil.

This text also encourages us to stay away from all kinds of sin. We're told to refrain from being frivolous and self-indulgent. We're told not to criticize our brothers and sisters in the Lord. Truth is, we're all going to end up kneeling side by side in the place of judgment. We're all going to face God eventually. Our critical, self-serving, and condescending behavior won't help us one bit in the end.

Yet we still complain! We still get offended! We cry out, "What about me? What about what I want? I never get my way. I never get to ride shotgun! I always have to get in the back seat. I never get to be the one in charge." Ever feel like that? I sure have.

The trouble is, that kind of selfish attitude moves us right into that ugly place of self-indulgence and self-pity. And when we get there, we're very quick to take up an offense when we don't get our own way.

It seems to me there are way too many in this world who have been "highly offended." We've been aggravated and offended by the government, by family, friends, and former friends, and even by Church members, (not to mention former church members).

Let me ask you:

Question: Do you find that you are easily offended, and do you believe you are justified in your offense? **Answer:** Get over it!

At least that's what jumped out at me as I read this text. While Romans 13:8 tells us not to run up a lot of debt, it also talks about the debt we do owe. We owe a debt of love. I'm convinced that we don't have the "right" to be offended by what people say and do to us. We only owe a huge debt of love for each other. Because Jesus first loved us.

So, when someone calls us "a no-good-so-and-so" or when we don't get our way let's not be offended. Let's not stoop to their level. Let's march to a different drumbeat. Let's pray for them. What do you think? Let's love all people in Jesus' Name. Amen.

Help Give a Milk Menagerie

Heifer International is celebrating 75 years of service to those in need throughout the world. Since 1944 Heifer has helped, directly or indirectly, more than 32 million families move toward greater self-reliance through the gift of livestock and training in environmentally sound agriculture. The work is ongoing; "nearly one billion people around the world still live in poverty."



During the Lenten season, the people of Zion will again have the opportunity to support Heifer International. As we have done for many years, we are working to donate a specific item for Heifer. In the past, Zion's gifts have included sheep, fish fingerlings, chickens, bees, and rabbits. This year, we are planning to donate a MILK MENAGERIE at a cost of \$1000.

The gift of a Milk Menagerie represents a heifer, two goats, and a water buffalo – four milk-producing animals that will produce gallons of life-sustaining milk that can be sold or turned into cheese and yogurt. Plus each animal's offspring will multiply the impact even further through Passing on the Gift.

A container will be in the back of the sanctuary during Lent for any contributions people would like to

make. Our congregation has always been very supportive of Heifer in the past, and will hopefully be just as supportive this year. If you choose to donate by writing a check, please make it out to Hattie Brooks Skinner Circle and mark Heifer in the memo line. The Finance Committee and your church leadership works hard to be good stewards of your gifts. All of your contributions are deeply appreciated and carefully used! I want to clear up some apparent confusion, based on a comment I heard, about Zion's requests for money. First, we make only two appeals a year to support the ministry and building of Zion itself: our spring Consecration Sunday campaign and our October Catch-up Sunday, which helps to ensure that we are on a solid financial footing as we finish the year and start into the next year.

Second, throughout the year you will also hear invitations to participate in second-mile giving. Since these invitations sometimes overlap, it's possible that some folks hear them as "the church is always asking for money." That is not the case, though, since these are opportunities to support special projects and ministries, not Zion itself. Any monies collected comes into the church and immediately goes out to the project you have specified, such as for UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) to assist disaster victims or Cambridge's Emergency Cold Weather Shelter, which cares for neighbors in need. Another such project is coming up during Lent to help buy a Milk Menagerie – I love that term – for needy families through the Heifer Project. Some of our second-mile giving invitations are for goods that you buy, such as presents for the Angel Tree or Shoe Box Ministry, or school supplies for backpacks for local students, or food for our church pantry.

All gifts are, of course, strictly voluntary. Should you make an estimate of giving and find that you cannot give as you intended, you can call the church office at any time to change your estimate. Likewise, when you hear about a second-mile giving opportunity, it's up to you to decide if this is a project that you choose to support in addition to your regular giving. While we recognize that not everyone will choose to or be able to support every project, we are pleased to provide many ministry options. God does love a cheerful giver, so please know that each and every contribution is deeply appreciated and wisely used.
